- ✓ Some Clubs are meeting in person ~ encourage those members attending to invite family members, neighbors & friends to your meetings.
- ✓ I have copies of letters Chaves County sent out to secure new members if you would like a copy.

The NM Young Republicans Chair, Rebekah Stevens advised that *New Mexico Republican Party Uniform State Rules, Amended Sept. 21, 2013*, provides on pp. 5 & 6 in Section 2-1-3 para. 7 that "The State Central Committee shall consist of a membership as follows: 7. "Three members to be selected by the New

Mexico Federation of Republican Women...." The three members would likely be the president plus the two members at large. This means that Members at Large need not be elected as county delegates in order to attend AND VOTE at RPNM Central Committee Meetings. I was allowed to vote at only one of the of RPNM Central Committee Meetings during the first 18 months. Apparently, we must remind whoever is in charge of convention registration about this reference, since RPNM has restricted voting privileges to only county delegates.

New Mexico Club Presidents' News

<u>Region A Director – Anita Statman</u>

The 2nd Qtr of 2021, a year after Covid arrived, was a welcome change of pace. FCFRW is on target for a big membership year due to their Membership Chair's hard work. They surged to 111 members due to mail outs and old-fashioned phone calls.

I was inspired by TCFRW's effort to honor law enforcement by assembling and delivering snack bags to county law enforcement agencies / stations.

Los Alamos had a bang-up fundraising tea in April. We had a record-breaking fundraiser in terms of new members, money raised and a successful food drive which benefitted our local food center.

I have continued conversations with Region A women about starting another FRW.

Four Corners FRW – Heather Curtis

FCFRW is gaining ground! Due to our hard-working Membership Chair, we now have 111 members! This has not been an easy task and was accomplished with mail outs and old-fashioned phone calls.

Our presentations are diverse and informative. We had programs including such speakers as our San Juan County Manager; NFRW 1st Vice President and Region 3 Director, Eileen Sobjack; New Mexico Oil and Gas Association Director of Communications Robert McEntyre; and Farmington Police Chief Steve Hebbee. We welcomed our Representatives for an update on the Legislative Sessions in May.

FCFRW proudly awarded the Spring Scholarship to Courtney Faith Beaver. Miss Beaver will use the \$750 to continue working towards her Nursing BSM.

For the first time in over a year we met in public at Pinon Hills Church. We joyfully had 64 members attend. We are positive that this number will grow as restrictions lift and the 2022 election season begins.

We look forward to watching minds and registrations of party affiliates change, from Democrat to Republican. FCFRW Board and Chairs remain vigilant in working hard to turn our state Red!

Los Alamos FRW – President Terra Fullbright

Efforts to attract new members have paid off. Membership increased to 26 plus 3 associates. We sent more emails detailing the importance of being members and how our money is used to help our community and candidates. LAFRW started emailing monthly recaps and have also started a brief newsletter to inform members about state politics.

In February members met for conversation, fellowship, and to support a conservative restaurant. We discussed a diaper drive to support our local Hope Center. Donations were plentiful. As pro-life supporters, we want to ensure parents seeking assistance thru Hope to know that LAFRW cares.

In April we held a Covid-PositiviTEA. Chaplain Jolyn McTeigue spoke on the positives resulting from her Covid experience. We had a great showing and were joined by NMFRW Ginger Paternostro and President Rhonda Stockert, who gave an uplifting speech. Through our Tea committee's hard work, our fundraiser was record breaking. The food drive with our tea benefitted the local food center.

In May we wound down for a summer hiatus. We had a local community leader speak on how we can get involved at the local level. We also collected snacks, drinks, and goodies for Police Appreciation Week. Our local police chief was very grateful for our donations. Also in May, our friends at the Hope Center asked for our assistance with their recent move, and we were happy to accommodate.

In June we held a garage sale fundraiser. We had great donations and an excellent turnout.

We are trying to get our name out to let people know that LAFRW cares about the community. We work heavily with RPLA and are blessed by their support.

LAFRW will volunteer at our Republican booth during summer concerts, passing out club information, mini constitutions and application forms for the *Constitution Day Essay Contest*. We will help with the RPLA summer picnic and are working on some awesome FRW T-shirts to raise funds.

Santa Fe FRW – President Anita Statman

This Spring we addressed two priorities: election integrity and *Caring for America /Caring for Santa Fe.* To spotlight election integrity we invited Theresa Atencio, Director of the Clerk's office for Elections and Voting in April to speak on procedures and becoming a VRA. Twelve took the class to become Voter Registration Agents (VRAs). In May the County Clerk spoke on election integrity and her plans for the office and county. We chose 4 nonprofits: Bienvenidos - a food pantry for homeless, CareNet - a pregnancy advisory service, Habitat for Humanity, & a Girls Youth Program to help quarterly. We held our 1st essay contest to recognize young conservative leaders. College-bound seniors wrote thoughtful essays on a segment of George Washington's farewell address. We awarded \$1,000 to an Estancia Valley Classical School senior (Hillsdale charter school) to attend Grand Canyon University pre-Med program.

We also worked on our NFRW scorecard to evaluate our efforts of the past 2 years. Club members volunteered 10,121 campaign hours, scoring 278 points. Our efforts were unprecedented in 2020!

Since then we are planning and promoting CD3's big summer event: *The Great American Picnic* in Santa Fe County, next month, Saturday, July 17.

As an effort to be a force in Republican campaigns, we started a monthly subscription program similar to *WinRed*. It will help co-fund a half-time office staff this fall and support activities through 2022.

Taos County FRW – **President Sadie F. Boyer** Since February, TCFRW met in March and May at the Don Fernando de Taos Hotel / Restaurant. In March we offered a choice of in-person or zoom. Our meetings begin with a no-host breakfast at 9 a.m. with the business meeting at 10 a.m.

- We begin each meeting with an Invocation, the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag, the Pledge to the NM Flag, a Quorum check, reading of the Minutes, and Treasurer's report.
- Membership Dues are \$40; Associate Dues are \$20 and our Fundraising Donation is \$50 per member. We have a total of 17 members and are working to exceed our 2020 total of 27 members.
- We honored all Taos County law enforcement: NM State Police, Taos County Sheriff's Dept., Taos Police Dept., Taos Pueblo Tribal Police, Taos Ski Valley Police Dept., Red River Police Dept., Game and Fish, and U. S. Forest Service. Volunteers shop for snacks and drinks and organize a workday to assemble and deliver them. We took pictures and posted them on Facebook and our website. It was a great experience and was well-received.
- Members reported 3,332 campaign volunteer hours - the highest total to date, even though a few members moved late in 2020 and didn't turn in hrs.
- Our Club Achievement Awards Team used the NFRW Roadmap to record & plan Club work. We earned 257 points and qualified for the *Diamond Award*. I recommend all Club Presidents use this tool to plan their work for the designated period.

- Future projects include: Honoring Nurses/Hospital Staff, Prepare a Membership Binder to include information for new and existing members, Newsletter, Candidate Recruitment, Voter Registration Agents, HAVA Volunteers (*Help America Vote Act*), Election Integrity Team and work with TCRP in combined events including funding to open Republican Headquarters.
- I participate in the NM Grassroots Republicans' Zoom meetings. These meetings are topnotch.
- I check the NFRW Website for new projects and distribute them to members. Listed items include: "Keep The Nine" Amendment and "Equality Act Legislation." For more info go to nfrw.org.
- Our club raises funds for TCRP 'VOICE' Headquarters which will hopefully open in Nov.
- Our MELP /Literacy Team chose the Rush Revere 5 book set by Rush Limbaugh. Included in the set are: Brave Pilgrims, First Patriots, American Revolution, Star - Spangled Banner and Presidency.
- Join us for "Liberty on the Rio Flag Day Celebration" at the Hotel Don Fernando de Taos on Friday, July 9 from 7-9 p.m. "Share Your 'VOICE' with Fellow Patriots!" Refreshments Served.
- We are glad to see RPNM' action plan involving County Chairs and offering help, where needed.
- We are "**saddened**" by so-called leaders in our state and nation. We will work for the Republican Party platform and hope that in future we elect more representatives that are of a like mind.

While our membership is at just 48 for the year (+20 associates), we have that many or more attending monthly meetings. Our club is eager to educate themselves and participate in this wonderful thing we call a democratic republic.

In February, we welcomed NM Business Coalition Carla Sontag as an associate member and speaker. We also created thank you notes for our conservative Republican legislators. Each card held from 15-50 signatures and notes of thanks.

March brought an interesting contrast between Eddy Aragon and Mark Moores as they spoke at the same event. Let's just say, I learned some things about having two alpha males speaking the same evening.

In April, we brought our 5 legislators in as a panel. They walked us through the last session in Santa Fe. They were tired and discouraged but clarified what happened and what must be done going forward.

Each meeting we hear an update on Protecting Life. We hear bits from our Sheriff about fighting gun control. And each meeting brings a moment of education from history or our daily lives.

In May we met at *Nick & Jimmy's Restaurant*. Despite Covid limitations, 43 people attended! Our keynote speaker, Eddy Aragon of *"The Rock of Talk"* radio show, spoke about the problems with fraud in the 2020 election, illegal immigration, crime and other issues, which the governor refuses to address.

In April we met at *El Pinto Mexican Cantina* with 40 attending. State Senator & Minority Whip Craig Brandt and Representative Jason Harper spoke on the 2021 60-day session in Santa Fe. They noted that radical legislation passed due to the loss of moderate Democrats in 2020. They said that if registered Republicans support GOP candidates aggressively, we will win the House and governor races in 2022.

In May we met at El Pinto Mexican Cantina in Albq.

The first speaker at June's luncheon was Homeland Security Agent Bob Godshall, who summarized the southern border crisis, which he noted was addressed successfully during Trump's Administration. Biden foolishly ended President Trump's policies. We now have a major crisis of human trafficking and dangerous drugs entering the U.S. State Senator Mark Moores, who ran for the CD-1 special election, spoke about how to stimulate economic development in NM and reduce the crime rate. He explained how both issues are currently keeping New Mexico from attracting new businesses and more jobs. In May, we collected donations & diapers for *Care Net Pregnancy Centers of Albuquerque, a* faithbased, pro-life organization for *Caring for America*.

All things considered, San-Bern FRW fared well in the first half of 2021. We have 57 members and 11 associates. Our club is on summer break; however, our Board of Directors will *retreat* in July to discuss upcoming luncheons, speakers and events.

For members' convenience, we launched an online merchant account. We're currently working on the online *San-Bern Mercantile*, where members can purchase items to benefit the club.

Our next luncheon meeting is planned for August 21. Jay Block, candidate for NM Governor, will speak.

Even though the atmosphere in NM and the U.S. appears bleak, SBFRW remains confident and hopeful, preserving our peace, strength and courage, staying focused on club goals, and creating awareness of FRW and its impactful mission. NM House District 22 Representative Stefani Lord was the 1st guest speaker at our new location. She shared her experiences being in the minority as a first-time legislator. As a conservative with a strong personality, she fought to prevent poor legislation from being passed. Ronnie Lucero, who ran for CD-1, also spoke. He is also active in the LEXIT movement to educate the Latino Community on how they are being used by the Democrat Party and how closely their values match Conservative values. LEXIT = *Latinos Exiting the Democrat Party*.

In May 2021 CD-1 Candidate Mark Moores and 2022 Governor Candidate Jay Block spoke. Both candidates shared views of what NM should be.

In June Albuquerque City Council District 9 Candidate Susan Renee Grout and Candidate for Lt. Governor Anise Golden Morper both spoke. FRW Member Anise ran for CD-3 in 2020. Finally, Tom Stull spoke to us. He submitted his application to fill the NM House seat left vacant by Democrat CD-1 winner Melanie Stansbury who was elected in June.

This was a challenging year. We made the best of it by communicating via email and Newsletters. We reviewed/updated our By-Laws and Standing Rules. We look forward to the future. We will assist Party Candidates and work to win City Council and School Board elections. We are recruiting new members.

Region C Director – Caren Lulich

I attended the Chaves County FRW meeting last week and learned they were hosting a round table forum with local leaders entitled "*Cannabis in our Community*". This forum was open to the public. **Chaves County made the bed.**

At our last NMFRW Executive Committee, concern was raised about local Republican parties affecting membership; women were hesitant to join as they thought we were part of the state or local Republican party. We initiated a new opportunity for members, quarterly roundtable discussions centered on issues affecting the county and state. The first roundtable was held last week. The topic was *Cannabis in Our Community*. Local elected leaders and a medical marijuana business owner spoke on the issue.

Looking forward, September 11 is set for our biennial fundraiser, the Cowboy Prom. The Graham Brothers from Lincoln County will provide live entertainment.

Doña Ana County FRW – Denise Anderson/Acting This has been a difficult time for DACFRW. New President, Elaine Rafferty passed away unexpectedly in February. As Vice President, I temporarily took over as President until someone else steps up, but this is difficult because I work full-time. Several committees are also missing chairs as it is difficult to find women willing to serve. The restrictive public health orders have made it challenging for our group to meet in person. Our membership is also down due to this not being a major election year, not being able to meet in person, the inability to provide food at meetings and the lack of computer skills among some members to use Zoom in order to participate in remote meetings. Our group is social and enjoys getting together with other like-minded women.

On a positive note, we continued to meet remotely monthly until May when we met in person. We had wonderful guest speakers on subjects such as: Legislative Updates, The State of the GOP in New Mexico and Nationally, Differences between how local Democrats and Republicans operate, Stories from a Vietnam War Medic, and What is happening in Public Schools. Each program was informative.
