State of our State:

New Mexico is increasing childcare subsidies that are already the most generous and broadly available in the U.S. Low and middle-income New Mexico families have had access to the most generous childcare subsidies in the country since last June, but they still paid as much as \$900 per month for one child. Starting next week, the copay will be waived, and childcare will be basically free for all families up to nearly twice the median income in the state. They're the latest copay waivers approved by Gov. Michelle Lujan Grisham, who continues her effort to buy votes. It's a problem that has bedeviled the state for years: Construction projects, supported by millions in capital outlay appropriations, sit idle or move slowly. In the past, analysts said the reasons for work being delayed or halted ranged from insufficient funds to finish the work to hiring enough employees to get those jobs done. This year, however, another factor was at play — the pandemic. Supply chain delays, rising construction costs and short staffing challenges, all byproducts of

the pandemic, have contributed to an outstanding capital outlay project fund topping \$2B, a new Legislative Finance Committee report says. And since there's another \$2.2B in new capital outlay appropriations tied to 1,400 state and local projects in the works, that balance is likely to grow and bottlenecks further tighten. When funds are not spent in a timely fashion, benefits are delayed. Funds "lose value" over time especially if construction cost increases and other unexpected expenditures diminish the impact of the original capital outlay money. The Bureau of Labor Statistics reported the cost of nonresidential construction rose 16.7% from March 2021 to March 2022, Nina Chavez, an analyst for the Legislative Finance Committee, told the committee members. At stake are the future of some 3,300 active projects in the state. Of those, about 2,000 have not progressed to the point of production according to the report.

Since the inception of the National Federation of Republican Women in 1938, members worked to recruit, educate, elect Republicans, and demonstrate an allegiance to the Republican Party. On the road to Election Day, clubs are doing their part in giving Republican candidates a platform to speak, to ask questions, and to educate us all on issues confronting New Mexicans.

Just remember, the past has taught us a lot; one, when we are divided, the opposition wins. This isn't new to any of us, yet can be repeated if we fail to unite. And all of this comes at the expense of each one of us volunteering for the good of society, family, and a stronger foundation. For this is why we decided to become a member of NMFRW. Senatorial Committee; and Mike Thom, Nat'l Rep. Congressional Committee. Oklahoma will host the 2023 Convention.

The NMFRW sponsored several Governor Candidate Forums and I was able to attend Chaves County, Alamogordo and Dona Ana County. We also had a Rally that brought members from Lea County and Chaves County FRW's along with other organizations to rally against Governor Lujan.

REGION A - Anita Statman, Regional Director

This Spring has been a busy one trying to do new things. I have been helping our new candidate club, Enchanted North get ready to hold its first event and prepare an application to the NMFRW and the NFRW for official club status. Terra and her team have sent out postcards, worked the phones, and used flyers to advertise their launch event. Many of us were privileged to be at the launch on April 9 in Angel Fire. Terra presented a wonderful slate of speakers including our president Teresa Barncastle and candidates Alexis Martinez Johnson, Rebecca Dow, and local judges.

You may recall at the last meeting I shared with you my intent to invite each county in CD3 which includes Region A to participate in a survey that will provide data that helps our candidates reach swing voters and turn those counties a little more red. The project is to survey swing voters by county to identify their priority issues this summer. The goal of course is to give every candidate on the Republican ticket a leg up by giving them specific information about voters that they can use to deliver much more targeted messages to those swing voters. Each county that participates will receive the data from the survey. After all we're in it to win it and we have to do something different.

An early 2022 guick survey by the RNC of the new CD3 showed regional variations by county. Diving deeper we learned that the survey wasn't statistically reliable, but it shows differences that we believe are there. Based on this work and the work chronicled in the Colorado Blueprint we launched the idea of collecting voter data of swing voters to make a difference in 2022. I'm in talks with Campaign Marketing Strategies or CMS Connects, professional polling and survey firm (see CMSConnects.com). They perform all types of surveys and polls to identify what voters care about and help candidates and organizations bring smart and targeted messages to the audience who matter at the moment it matters most. The project will use both robocalling and individual phone calls to talk to at least 400 swing voters in CD3s 18 counties, if everyone participates. This heavy emphasis on phone calls will yield a confidence level of +/-4%. Swing voters are defined as +/- 3% including weak Dems, DTS, Ind, Lib, and weak Republicans according to GOP Data Center.

Over the last few months we've flipped this project from being a RPNM project to an NMFRW project. That was approved by the executive committee in April. (revised report) The NMFRW voted to approve funding from the NMFRW Campaign line item based on support from the other agencies/jurisdictions.

The value the county receives is that you can give your house and statewide candidates the scoop on what your swing voters care most about. The ultimate beneficiaries are the Republican candidates that use this data to bring swing voters into our column. Something we haven't had before in our quiver.

Ryan Lane were all in attendance to update us on the 2022 Legislative Session. That evening, FCFRW hosted Paul Gessing with the Rio Grande Foundation. Mr. Gessing gave us his insights on the 2022 Session and offered some positive thoughts on how we might be able to turn the tide.

In April FCFRW invited Statewide Candidates with many running attending to speak to our members and answer any questions. Our May program will include Gubernatorial Candidates, with all those running confirming they will come. As of today, 192 people have RSVP'd to attend this meeting.

FCFRW membership was at 66 when we last reported in January, 2022. 2nd VP of Membership, Sally Bramhall launched a letter campaign. With this effort and her attendance at all Regular Meetings and special events she has increased membership to 149 members and 43 associates.

Unfortunately, FCFRW Board had to make the very hard decision not to fund our 2022 PAC due to our fundraising receiving a stop and decease from the New Mexico Lottery and Gaming Division. FCFRW is currently in the process of working out a Republican voting campaign to be done via radio in San Juan County and the Navajo Nation.

FCFRW will continue to make lemonade out of the lemons our current state government puts before us. At least until, we turn it red!
