President's Report 2022-2023

Two years has flown by. I feel so blessed to have had this experience. Two years ago, I hit the ground running organizing our committees and getting them started on their projects. I identified all of our requirement deadlines from National and all of our clubs met some of them and most met all.

The NMFRW was excited to start two new clubs Otero and Enchanted North. Unfortunately, we had one club disband, Grant County FRW. We had great membership numbers in 2022 reaching a high of 952 only to lose that gain in 2023. We finished 2023 with a loss of 13.3% (124).

I had the privilege of attending all the Board of Directors' meeting both in person and on zoom with one exception where $\mathbf{1}^{\text{st}}$ VP Terra Fullbright carried my proxy. While there she met Ted Cruz and got her picture taken with him. I vowed not to miss another meeting.

I represented the NMFRW at all the Republican Party of New Mexico State Central Committee meetings. The Republican Party of New Mexico has solid plans for turning New Mexico to a Republican majority and the NMFRW ladies will be there to support those efforts.

I believe I submitted at least 10 stories and events to the NFRW for publishing. Almost all of the stories and all of the events were published. These included our Armed Services project, all of our board meetings and our convention. We will continue to make headlines.

Our two years culminated in receiving the status of Excellence in the Betty Heitman State Achievement Award program. This status was achieved by meeting the requirements such as publishing a newsletter at least four times a year, having all the clubs turn in their officer lists before January 1st of each year, and having 74% of our clubs participate in the Hours and Calls program.

We were able to receive the award at the National Federation of Republican Women Biennial Convention. I was so proud of all the ladies that were able to attend. Having 16 members represent New Mexico was probably a first.

My greatest joy of the past two years has been to get to know so many amazing women and to help so many clubs. I tried to keep all the club presidents apprised of everything by sending a few emails and I was able to visit 11 of our clubs. I want to again thank everyone for the outpouring of kindness during my mother's illness and

subsequent loss of her and then my brother. 2022 and 2023 were amazing years thanks to the women of the FRW.

dollars needed from them. In hindsight we learned that voters cared a lot about the abortion decision and our candidates didn't successfully address the issue. Another issue was that voters in some Republican counties failed to show up. We lost the governorship by a few thousand votes.

I also supported Terra Fullbright to start a new club in northern New Mexico and she did. She used the national guidance forms and bylaws to get started. She hosted a wonderful kick-off meeting in the Spring of 2022 with guests Alexis Martinez Johnson and Rebecca Dow. Her club was approved soon after and Enchanted North was born! I also tried to work with Curry County's burgeoning Women's club, but they didn't return my calls.

It looks like Sharon Clahchischilliage will be running for CD 3-NM in 2024 and she'll need all of our support. The next Region A Director will need to help her.

The 42nd Biennial Convention for the National FRW was held in Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, September 28th through October 1st.

Sunday morning a prayer breakfast was held before we went into the General Ses-


sion. The final Credentials report was made with 692 Delegates, 134 Alternates and 93 Guests.

National initiated a new Hours and Calls Award program with 50% of our clubs participating the first year and 75% participating the second year. NMFRW reporting clubs volunteered the equivalent of over 4 million dollars.

14 out of our 17 clubs submitted their National FRW Achievement Award forms. This resulted in 10 of our clubs achieving the highest level of Diamond, one club reached Gold, two received Silver and our newest club Otero reached Bronze. Many of our clubs were represented at the National Biennial Convention to receive their award on stage.

The NMFRW submitted the Betty Heitman Achievement Program for State Federation forms and received the

Campaign/Political Education

It all started with a Gubernatorial Forum in February of 2022. With many of our clubs planning and carrying out Forums with unique and fun formats, we all pushed forward to help our candidates get their names out to the public.

The NFRW held a Candidate School the last couple of years. This year the school was free to FRW Members. This 10-week school covers all aspects of the Candidates path from declaration to the election.

NFRW is a wealth of information leading us through many current issues such as the Keep 9 Campaign from earlier this year

I have held many Poll Challenger and Watcher classes at home and around the state for FRW and RP groups alike and recently went to Las Cruces to present GOP Data Center training.

I have shared how important local meetings are. When looking to fill open positions, look around for people that are active in the community as potential Candidates. Good officials in local positions are a great resource for state and national Candidates.

And then Referendums! FRW's around the state have been extremely active collecting signatures, we are nearing or surpassing our 10% mark around the state.

New laws in NM have created concerns about election Integrity which has taken a front row seat in everyone's mind. I am working with EIN-NM and groups around the country as we look at how elections are handled, what works and what doesn't. We talk about different agencies such as CISA (Cybersecurity Infrastructure Security Agency) – President Obama's administration designated our country's election infrastructure as "critical", a move that brought added federal protections to voting systems. On its own this is not a bad thing, unfortunately we have seen added laws restricting the public's access to information based on "Cybersecurity". This has reduced and will continue to reduce transparency in elections.

There are groups in NM (as well as other states) that are registering targeted voters. The RNC is supporting a push for absentee/mail-in ballots. In this state, absentee ballot requests can be harvested, (hence the push to get specific groups of people registered to vote absentee) remember "ballot" harvesting is still illegal in New Mexico. With permanent absentee ballot registrations as a

part of the new laws, clean voter rolls are imperative. There are people around the state working hard finding discrepancies that can be shared with local County Clerks to help with this endeavor.

As we come into this election season, we continue to support our candidates and watch the election process. Around every corner there is something new to learn. Just when I think I have something figured out something new pops up and we start again!


Heritabe Girls and Trail Pleage of Allegience. Aspen Jaramillo from Los Ala-

She is actively working on cleaning up the voter rolls with others around the state and in Bernalillo County in 2021 7883 Voters were removed from the voter rolls and in 2023 Bernalillo removed 31,998 Voters from the voter rolls.

for officers and we started work on ByLaws presented by Jeanine Kelly, NMFRW ByLaws Chair.

During dinner awards were given followed by our final speaker of the convention—Michelle Buckwalter-Schurman who also installed our new officers.

But that time has long passed, and we need to talk to them – tell them how things have changed and how their party has been coopted by those who seek to turn your boy to a girl to satisfy their own perversion. The Santa Fe club currently has 82 members and 17 associates, 20 members down from last year. We attribute this loss to two factors: 1. that in off election year, there is less interest in our speakers; 2. that Republicans in general are worn down by the political scene. We saw this at our

first ever ZIP Code social, for which we called 271 Republican women who live in the Eldorado neighborhood. Of those, 20 RSVP'd, and 10 attended. Those who came spoke intensely about their experiences simply being Republicans in Santa Fe. Three ladies had grown up in communist regimes. No surprise they were the most articulate about our world situation. Although only one joined, the group bonded and hopes to meet again under the watch of our membership chair. Our second ZIP Code social should happen in January.

Otherwise, the SFFRW has enjoyed a productive two years. In 2022, we hosted the Turquoise and Tequila Fiesta at La Posada, entertaining 150 people with a tequila tasting, live and silent auctions, and flamenco dancing. This year we threw our biennial picnic at Las Campanas for 90 people, with country music and a live auction. Both events featured candidates as speakers. Together the two events raised about \$25,000 for candidates.

The Judith Nowers scholarship for college bound high school seniors is now in its third year and has risen to \$2000 thanks to a matching grant from an associate member.

In the election year, SFFRW luncheons became Candidates Are Us, with every possible candidate from our own Alexis Martinez Johnson, who ran for Congress in CD3, to the exciting debate amongst the five republican candidates in the primary governor race.
