Many projects are underway. The fundraising committee has already met. A new committee is being considered and plans are being developed for helping elect republicans.

#### Members—At—Large

The 30 day Legislative session will begin on January 17<sup>th</sup>, and there will be a Republican Legislative Dinner on January 25<sup>th</sup> with Representative Ryan Lane and Senator Greg Baca as guest speakers.

The 2024 NM Capitol Prayer Rally and March will be held on January 26<sup>th</sup> from Noon-2pm.

The NM Republican Party announced that all County Preprimary conventions shall be held in January and the State PrePrimary Convention will be held on February 24<sup>th</sup> in Albuquerque.

In March all counties in NM shall hold their Quadrennial conventions followed by the State Quadrennial Convention on April 27<sup>th</sup> and Early voting begins on May 7<sup>th</sup>.

I want to encourage NMFRW women to run for delegate positions at their local conventions. This 2024 election cycle will be one of the most important ones we, as Republicans, will face. Regardless of who the candidates will be after the June primary, we MUST get behind the winners and make sure NM goes RED!!!

## Campaign/Political Education

As we ramp up to the Primaries, we are busy in all Counties around the state with Pre-Primary Conventions. In these conventions delegates will be chosen to vote for candidates for the primary election.

Candidates will be traveling around the State speaking at meeting and conventions with an eye on taking back seats around the state held by Democrats.

My plan for this year is to highlight Candidates from now until the primaries so we can get to know the people running for office. Past the primary we will continue to put out pertinent information leading up to the November election.

There have been some changes to laws that effect our elections ... here are a few things to remember.

New Mexico will begin automatic voter registration when an eligible voter interacts with a department of motor vehicles beginning July1, 2025. New Mexico now offers permanent absentee ballots.

The Secretary of State will issue the Proclamation for the General Election on January 29<sup>th</sup>. The voter registration of a candidate cannot be updated or changed after this date.

Statewide and federal offices will file with the Secretary of State. All other Candidates will file with the county clerk in the county in which the candidate resides.

### Campaign/Political Education (continued)

#### Did you ever wonder why ...?

Effective June 14, 2019, New Mexico entered in an "Agreement Among the States to Elect the President by National Popular Vote". As noted in our New Mexico Statutes 1-15-4.1. This agreement will terminate if the Electoral College is abolished. Currently we choose our Presidential Electors based on the statewide vote. If we are joined by enough states and get to 270 electors, our state officials would appoint electors based on who they believe received the most popular votes nationwide. Currently this "Agreement Among the States" is at 230 electors from the states that are participating.

### This is worrisome because ...

States that have the greatest number of electors would be visited by Presidential Candidates the most. States such as ours with only 5 electorates would not have the draw of the more populous states, and in most cases no power to change the vote, therefore effectively losing our voice.
