Many members of the NMFRW were kept informed by Cindy Runyon's daily BTNM Legislative Updates and Calls to Action throughout the entire 2023 Legislative Session. Ali Ennenga and Cristina Arnold produced a write up on "How to for Calls to Action" which was sent out to all County FRW Presidents. Cristina Arnold created two Legislative Updates focused on NMFRW Legislative Priorities. One at the beginning of the session and one at the very end of the session. Nancy Brenna and Cristina Arnold worked to get feedback from Republican Legislators, with little success. A new approach will be taken for the 2024, hopefully garnering more success.

For the road ahead, many members are currently working on Referendums to stand against destructive legislation that was signed by the governor. Gayle Martinez and Cristina Arnold, will soon begin researching NM Adoption Laws to determine if legislative amendments can be made to clear the legal path for families to adopt in our "Adoption over Abortion" Campaign.

Campaign/Political Education Committee Report

As we head into the 2023 Local Elections it has never been clearer how important each position is in every county and state!

I was able to talk to legislators on both sides of the aisle in Santa Fe while they were in session. Called, wrote, zoomed, testified, appeared in person and was even able to participate in a prayer walk at the Capitol, as some of the crazy bills were being presented. It was eye opening to say the least.

And then it was on to REFERENDUMS! Fighting six of the worst bills signed into law in recent memory. Removing parental rights under the guise of Health with **HB7** "the reproductive and gender affirming healthcare freedom act", promising to fine public entities or individuals that interfere with a child's access to such care. Adding more healthcare centers to schools SB397, protecting those treating our children without our approval SB13, then adding a clause that prohibits laws, policies or bans to stop these same laws. Forcing us to accept extreme ideals HB207 by creating a protected class of people, then stifling our freedom of speech all the while. And finally let's add the two election laws, one that reduces the transparency of elections **SB180** giving the Secretary of State access to tax records and makes the County Clerks responsible for training our Challengers and watchers to just name a small portion of the bill. **HB4** Voting Right Protections, continues with automatic voter registration without the ability to opt out until after the fact, allowing felons to vote if not incarcerated, more ballot boxes, and declaring election day a school holiday.

These small snippets have kept most of us busy for the last couple of months collecting signatures to keep the bills from going into law or at the very least to make sure they make it to the ballot in 2024.

I have been working in conjunction with Election Integrity Network of New Mexico (EIN-NM) talking about voting technologies, vulnerable voters, vote by mail and rank choice voting. Looking at processes and practices – what is working, what is not and what else is out there.

The National Federated Republican Women (NFRW) and the Republican Party of New Mexico (RPNM) have held Candidate trainings, just in time for us to launch into the next round of elections. Candidates for the 2023

elections will declare on August 29th for the November election.

It has never been more apparent that we must elect candidates to local, state, and federal positions that are willing to represent our conservative values.

Presidents Report

The last four months have been filled with meetings, education and deadlines. Membership, Awards and Convention Deadlines were the hot topics. I was able to attend all the President and Region 4 zoom meetings. However, due to a prior commitment, I was unable to attend the NFRW Board meeting. But I am happy to say 1st VP Terra Fullbright was able to attend with my proxy.

Our membership is slowly growing back to last year's totals. We did meet our goal of 751 by June to allot New Mexico a total of 7 Delegates at Large to the National Convention. Each club has met the requirement to have one Delegate, thus, giving us a total of 24 Delegate slots to fill. I have the Club Certification form, Worksheet and Presidents' Certification form ready to file on June 21st.

for American project forms and Armed Services project forms. The state winners have been submitted to National. Also submitted to National was the Betty Heitman Achievement Award for States form and the Armed Services form for State projects. All of these awards will be announced at the National FRW Convention in September.

I had the privilege of giving the history of the NFRW at the Chaves County FRW meeting and will be giving it at two more meetings later this summer.

The Nominations notice has gone out to all Presidents and Board members with the deadline for selfnominations being July 15th. The Call for the NMFRW Convention is being prepared and is scheduled to be sent by email in August.

New Mexico Now

- Carla Sontag

Carla is with the New Mexico Business Coalition and the founder of Better Together New Mexico.

Carla led with numbers. In the state of New Mexico our employment numbers of the population approximately 922,600 people are employed, 98,700 are on Medicaid. 72% of children are on Medicaid and over half are on assis-

tance.

30-40% are functioning in society.

Our state budget in 2019 \$6 billion, after MLG came in it rose to \$9.6 billion, a 60% increase in four years. Oil & gas is 40% of the budget. We had a surplus of \$3.5 billion and now have a deficit of \$119 million. With \$250 million lost from workforce solutions (money paid out for unemployment).

NM is 51st in education and 50th in all else; employment, child welfare, governor, public safety etc. But there is good news, Better Together NM is helping with the referendum and AMAC is putting out the information as well. Carla runs the New Mexico Sun another paper that welcomes conservative ideas.

Current initiatives are important, school boards, county commissions, city councils, water boards and soil & water commissions.

We are working to get six bills on the ballot in 2024 to be voted on. We did not get enough signatures by June 15, so are now shooting for 80,000 by next July. These effect parental and constitutional rights.

Groups that are taking the lead: Change Course NM, The Library Guild, Right to Life, NM Family Action Movement, One Name One Banner, Churches and the FRW. Resources can be found on multiple websites including the BTNM website.

Carla ended her presentation



with a challenge: She will provide the club that produces the most signatures with two tickets to their annual hero's event.

FRW's across the state are actively obtaining signatures and spreading the word. Cindi gave us encouragement to continue the fight and where we go from here.





By Laws Committee Report

Jeanine Bingham-Kelly our By-laws Chair presented the proposed changes to the group at large. Included were aligning the Objective and Policies section to coincide with NFRW's which caused a reformatting of all sectional outlining. Most changes were semantics (i.e. Chairman to President), moving of standing rules into By-laws and removing un-used positions (i.e. data entry clerk). All the proposed changes will be in the Biennial Convention Call.

It was discussed re-aligning the Regions to allow better coverage by Directors. The proposed new Districts will be voted on by the Board during a Special meeting by Zoom. Regional Directors will be voted on at the Regional caucuses prior to the Convention.

Albuquerque FRW Report

Our focus at the beginning of the year was obviously on the upcoming legislative session. Paul Gessing of the Rio Grande Foundation was our January speaker to discuss what bills to expect and prepare to support or oppose.

Our December 2022 speaker was Michelle Garcia-Holmes and February's speaker was Yvette Herrell. They offered insights into the obstacles Republicans face in New Mexico as we discussed the November 22 elections results. Some of us went home angry. One thing I learned was that the Republican Party in Washington does not understand New Mexico and our demographics. To paraphrase NM Territorial Governor Lew Wallace, "what works everywhere else is bound to fail in New Mexico." Our current focus is to prepare for this Fall's elections.

In May we had conservative Albuquerque School Board member Courtney Jackson as our speaker. She was elected in 2022. She talked about the current actions the Board is taking to hold APS accountable for student outcomes. (We are failing in our obligations to our students.) She shared the documents that will be leading the reforms. I have copies of the "Goals and Guardrails" and the Survey with me. I can forward an email of the 3 documents to you if you are interested.

At our June 28th meeting, our City Council member Renee Grout will be speaking on the issue of youth homelessness in Albuquerque and the proposal to move to a City Manager form of government for Albuquerque.

In July we will be combining with Metro FRW to hear a conservative planning to run for a City Council seat. We need to start locally if we are to have an impact on our communities and effect a future change in our State government.

We joined Better Together New Mexico in January and were thankful for their informative leadership and giving our members the vehicle to make their voices heard.

At our April and May meetings we were able to have Lisa Chapman, a volunteer with the Referendum Project, at our meetings to allow our members to sign the six petitions. It is important that we support those who enable us to have an impact in preserving and supporting Conservative values.

To top off our meeting Yvette Herrell encouraged us to stay strong to our conservative beliefs, Caring for America Committee delivered cupcakes, ice cream, handmade Valentine cards to the Assurance Home.

March our speaker was our Sheriff Mike Herrington who spoke about our border concerns, human & drug trafficking & how cartels use children as young as 14 who are forced to leave families & are used for human trafficking.
